**PRESIDENT'S OVERVIEW**

I am pleased to present the Annual Report for the Financial Year 2008-2009, our 33<sup>rd</sup> year of operation. The global financial crisis has presented us with a number of challenges, however we have maintained our level of services and plan to do the same into the future. For the year we made a loss of \$34,429.00; this is not sustainable in the long term so in preparing the budget for next year we have been looking at ways to increase income and ways to contain expenditure. The Association needs a strong financial base and our income from both telemarketing and donations has remained strong. Queensland Health has again provided major funding of \$134,116 this year, which continues to support Welfare and Respite services throughout Queensland. We sincerely thank Queensland Health for their ongoing support.

Our Operations Manager, Barbara Gray has once again led the overall administration and operation of the Association very successfully. She has been ably assisted by our Administration Officer, Lisa Gordon and Helen Johnston as Bookkeeper for our telemarketing activities. Unfortunately Lisa has left the Association to take up a full time position. We have also been very fortunate with keen volunteers to assist with our administration and fundraising work and I would like to personally thank them one and all.

Our Welfare services continue to be the focus of our activities and in January 2009 we appointed Theresa Byrne as a part-time Welfare Officer and she is providing additional hours of welfare support in addition to coordinating the Day Respite activities. Our Senior Welfare Officer, Julie Morrow and Welfare Officer Christine Parfitt have continued to provide support, information services, guidance and advocacy for all of our families affected by Huntington's Disease throughout Queensland. They have arranged support and carer group meetings throughout the State with these now occurring in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton, Fraser Coast, Burnett, Toowoomba, the Sunshine and Gold Coast as well as Brisbane. Julie, Christine and now Theresa continue to make regular trips to visit HD families in all of these regions. The Day Respite continued to operate each Tuesday and two Fridays a month at Florence Dannell House. Theresa, Iris Simpson and Helen with the help of many volunteers, including Rob Farmer make this day an enjoyable one for those who attend. I would like to thank them all on behalf of the Committee and the attendees.

In last year's report I raised the issue of YPIRAC (Younger Persons In Residential Aged Care) and this still remains the most challenging issue our staff face. The fact that the demand for satisfactory accommodation positions far exceeds the supply has caused a number of issues. In February of this year I was invited to join the Queensland Working Party for YPIRAC organised by Disability Services Queensland.

I am pleased to advise that the Association has established the "Huntingtons Queensland Fund" with The University of Queensland to support research into a cure and/or treatment for Huntington's Disease. The first research project is to support pre-clinical trials of the drug PMX205 with the HD R6 transgenic mouse models plus an

examination of complement factor expression in the brain of Huntington's Disease patients. We will have regular updates on this research in our Newsletters.

Lastly I would like to thank my committee, staff, volunteers and all members of the Association for their support and assistance throughout the year.

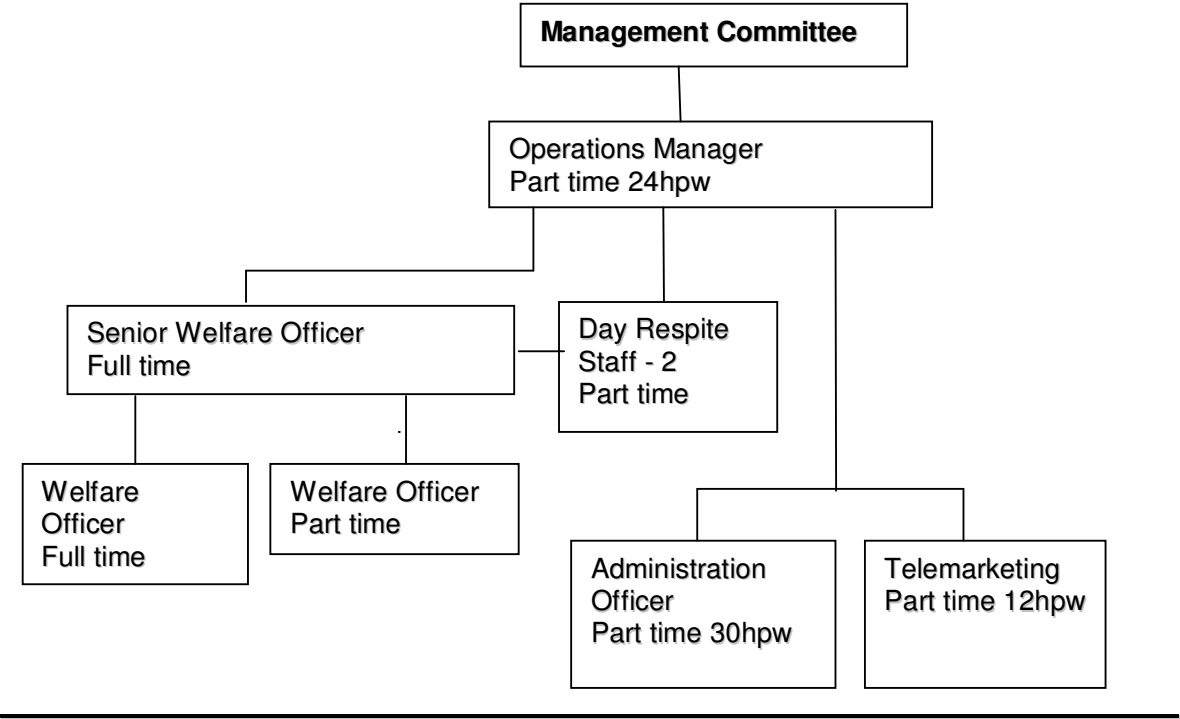
**MISSION**

**Management Structure** – Huntingtons Queensland is an incorporated Association under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 and has a Committee of Management, elected from the Association membership, that is responsible for governance of the Association.

Huntingtons Queensland is committed to improving quality of service through regular evaluation of it's practices and through improving funding.

**Organisational Structure**



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**MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE**

Membership of the Management Committee currently stands at six. This small group meets monthly to consider and adopt reports, monitor operations and expenditure and the implementation of the operational plan, and to make decisions on future planning.

At the previous Annual General Meeting, Pam Cummings was elected as a Committee member and in January 2009 Lisa McGuinness joined our group. Lisa is currently on leave of absence.

It is important that we recruit additional membership to the Management Committee. Currently membership consists of a mix of family members and others who have an interest in the Association.

### **STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS**

**Staff:** There has been no change to our staffing during the reporting period.

**Welfare** – Julie Morrow, Senior Welfare Officer and Christine Parfitt, Welfare Officer continued in their respective roles. Effective as at January 2009 the Management Committee approved an injection of additional hours into the Welfare Service resulting in an increase of 16 hours per week. Theresa Byrne, who is employed as Day Respite Facilitator, has now joined the Welfare team as a part-time Welfare Officer to accommodate this increase.

**Administration** – During the year Administration staff has remained unchanged with the ongoing employment of Barbara Gray, Operations Manager, Lisa Gordon, Administration Officer and Helen Johnston Telemarketing Bookkeeper. While all Administration staff members are employed on a part time basis, care is taken that the HD office is manned at all times during working hours.

**Volunteers:** To maintain our support services the Association relies on the goodwill of many volunteers who assist with administration duties, fundraising, and the Day Respite Program. In addition the Townsville Support Group is made up entirely of volunteers; and a group of family members and friends in the North Coast region volunteer many hours fundraising on our behalf. In total, volunteer numbers across Queensland are in the vicinity of 60-70 people. Some volunteers have been with us since our inception in 1976 and to them all we say "thank you" for your wonderful support.

**Staff Training:** Training has been identified and offered to staff and volunteers during the year. This training included: Falls Prevention Workshop – Queensland Health; Public Trustee on the topics of Enduring Power of Attorney and Wills; and Contemporary Community Care Workshop Program facilitated by Community Care Queensland. In addition our new part-time Welfare Officer was involved in an induction and handover process with other Welfare staff.

The National Huntington's Disease Conference in Adelaide was attended by 3 staff members and the President. The sessions provided useful insights and practical approaches for our Welfare staff when supporting people with Huntington's Disease.

### **WELFARE SERVICE**

The primary focus of the Association is the support of individuals and families affected by Huntington's Disease through information, referral, respite, support group activities

and emotional support. Our overall goal is to provide a flexible service to meet the varying supports needs of families.

Support is offered to family members, community support services and health professionals throughout Queensland.

In addition to the support provided to families in Brisbane and near surrounding areas, a schedule of visits to regional areas is undertaken by staff and all major centres throughout Queensland are visited twice a year. These visits are complemented by telephone contact with families and networking with health professionals and community support groups.

### **Support Groups:**

Support Group activities have been maintained during the year with all groups meeting on a regular basis offering a range of social, interactive activities that support all members of the family.

### ***The Annerley Day Respite Program***

The day respite program is held at the HD Centre in Annerley and is offered to those living in Brisbane and surrounding areas. The program continues to offer a range of activities such as: ten pin bowling; therapies such as relaxation, exercise and music; games and group quizzes and crosswords; and outings. Morning tea and a hot midday meal are served. Day Respite consists of a weekly Tuesday program and a fortnightly Friday program - average attendances are 14 for the Tuesday group and 6 for the Friday group.

Transport is organised by the Association through a variety of community transport options, staff pick-ups and family assisted transport.

An important component of the day respite program is to ensure the program is meeting an individual's changing needs. When needed, participants are supported to transition into the Friday program or to transition out of the day respite program in a gradual process. Other community day respite options are explored and the Association continues to offer support to a person leaving the program and their family through the Welfare Service.

We have been fortunate to retain the services of Iris Simpson (Huntington's Disease Coordinator, Queensland Health) and Theresa Byrne who both facilitated the program. We appreciate the support of Helen Johnston (staff) and our regular volunteers who very ably assist in a variety of ways to ensure the smooth running of the day's activities. Rob Farmer (volunteer) has been with the Day Respite Program since its inception and has contributed his time on a very regular basis. We appreciate and sincerely thank Rob for his ongoing support.

Many of our clients attend Day Respite programs offered by other local services. The Welfare team aims to provide support through networking and training for the staff and volunteers of these services.

Community Placements – The Association accepted Year 1 medical students from Griffith University School of Medicine for placement at the Day Respite Program as part of their Health in the Community theme in the medical program. The aim of community placements for medical students is to provide a wider perspective of the health care needs and service provision in the general community. The voluntary contribution of these medical students is appreciated by the Association.

### **Respite Holidays**

One Respite Holiday was held during the year.

Family Respite Holiday: In December 2008 the Association held its second Family Holiday at Maroochydore on the Sunshine Coast. Five families, including 6 parents and 13 children from Brisbane and regional Queensland joined Welfare staff for a three-day break.

The aim of the holiday is to bring families with young children together to meet new friends, renew friendships and to enjoy a fun and relaxing break. Activities included: swimming, music and singing, chatting and generally having a great time. The final day was spent at Aussie World that has a range of rides and attractions; families then returned home with tired but excited children already asking when they can go again.

### **Family Support Group Meetings**

Regular meetings are held in Toowoomba and the Gold Coast. Families in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton, Bundaberg, Fraser Coast, Burnett, and North Coast meet when Welfare staff visit their region. Some groups also meet informally without the involvement of the Welfare staff. These events provide an opportunity for families to meet in a relaxed atmosphere and develop support networks and friendships.

The Townsville Support is a more structured group, conducting their own fundraising and meetings. Funds raised in the area are used to support local families and to meet the costs of Christmas activities and other social events.

### **Carers' Support Group**

The Brisbane Carers' Group continues to meet on a regular basis with the Association staff having an active presence in all of the group's activities. Most meetings are held at the Huntington's Disease Centre in Annerley.

Activities include: Representative from the Relaxation Centre gave an interesting talk on self-care and relationships; a presentation by Public Trustee on enduring power of attorney and wills; and a visit to Mayes Cottage in Brisbane.

Welfare staff work closely with Qld Carers and the Commonwealth Respite and Carelink Centres in both Brisbane and regional areas. Qld Carers offers assistance to family carers who are experiencing difficulties in their role of caring through information, counselling and advocacy. The Commonwealth Respite and Carelink Centres provide funding assistance for respite, information and options about respite care, referrals to local and regional service providers, and emotional support in relation to caring.

Through the Association's Newsletter, useful information from a wide range of services is regularly published, ensuring that carers from all parts of Queensland have access to information.

**Activities for children and families** – Maintaining a family focus is important. During the year, the staff has steadily increased its support to families and provides several different recreational opportunities for young people. The main focus of the program is to provide group activities that young people can attend and meet others in a similar situation as themselves and reduce a sense of isolation. Overall the activities

that are offered play an integral part in their social, physical and emotional development.

**School Holiday Activities:** The partnership between Qld Carers and the Association has been operating for over 12 months. A group of young people meet 4 times per year during school holidays for one-day recreational activities. Types of outings include a picnic in the park, ten pin bowling, and putt putt at Victoria Park.

**Family Outings:** Welfare staff have organised family outings during school holidays and also when visiting regional areas. Activities include: ten pin bowling, lunches and a visit to Alma Park Zoo.

### **Information Provision:**

The Association provides up to date information through various methods of communication and resources to inform families about Huntington's Disease, services offered by the Association, and services available in the community that families can readily access. Information is distributed through the Association's Newsletter, Web Page, Library facility; mail outs; and through the National HD Awareness events.

**Fact Sheets** - Information is regularly reviewed to ensure it remains current and continues to meet the needs of families and services providing direct care to families.

**Web Page** - The Association's Web Page provides information on Huntington's Disease, the Association, fundraising activities and links to the Newsletters and other HD Associations throughout Australia and the world. The Web Page is currently being reviewed.

Diane Allen continues to provide technical support on a volunteering basis and in addition she and her husband Ken fund our Web Page. We are very appreciative of their ongoing support.

**Newsletters** - Five Newsletters were distributed during the year. Feedback from readers indicates that research articles and practical information for carers are most sought after. To meet this need, staff regularly source relevant information. Also featured in the Newsletter is information on the activities of the Management Committee and staff and fundraising matters.

**Library Facilities** - A selected range of books is available for purchase or through our lending library. There have been recent purchases of new books; the List of Publications Fact Sheet has been updated to reflect these changes.

**Inservice Training and Workshops** - To improve understanding of Huntington's Disease to services providing direct care to our families, the Welfare staff provide support and information to health and care professionals, residential care facilities and community support groups by way of in-service training, workshops and information mail-outs. In addition presentations were conducted at Bond University, Disability Services Queensland and secondary schools.

### **Non-Clinical Counselling and Referral:**

Welfare staff provide a non-clinical counselling service to families, either on an individual basis or group counselling. Families can access this service through home visits, telephone and visiting the HD Centre in Annerley. Advocacy and referral on behalf of families is an important aspect of the Welfare Service.

Staff members assist families to access a broad range of community support services such as respite, carer support, support packages, meals on wheels; health professionals such as dietitians, genetic counselling, doctors, speech pathologists; and organisations like Centrelink, Guardianship and Administrator, Taxi Subsidy Scheme.

### **HUNTINGTON'S DISEASE CLINIC**

The Huntington's Disease (HD) Clinic operates monthly from the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. This is the only public health medical clinic specialising in Huntington's Disease in Queensland. Iris Simpson (Huntington's Disease Coordinator, Queensland Health) coordinates the HD Clinic comprising a multi-disciplinary team of specialists including: Dr. John O'Sullivan (Neurologist), Cate Barrett (Speech Pathologist), Dr. Donna Spooner (Neuro Psychologist) and Dr. Rodney Marsh (Psychiatrist). Patients from regional Queensland regularly attend the clinic with the support of the Patient Transit Scheme.

The Association continues to support the the HD Clinic through funding the speech pathologist and also the attendance of the Senior Welfare Officer on clinic days providing non-clinical support to Iris Simpson.

### **YOUNGER PERSONS IN RESIDENTIAL AGED CARE INITIATIVE**

The Younger Persons in Residential Aged Care (YPIRAC) Initiative is a five year State and Commonwealth funded project that commenced in July 2006. This initiative has been established as part of Disability Services Queensland.

The primary aim of the initiative is to reduce the number of people aged 65 and under entering an aged care facility by developing age appropriate care options. The initiative will also allocate funding to provide additional support to people who choose to remain in an aged care facility.

During 2009, Gerry Doyle took up a position on the YPIRAC Reference Group to keep up to date with the progress of the initiative as well as present key issues affecting people with Huntington's Disease and their families.

Accessing age appropriate residential care for people under 65 with high care needs will continue to be difficult in the foreseeable future due to the limited number of places available and the high demand for this type of support. Delays in accessing residential care have been experienced and can result in inadequate care for people with Huntington's Disease as well as increase demands on carers and other family members.

We are also keenly waiting for the release of YPIRAC funding for younger people who will be remaining in aged care. This is expected to take place in the near future.

### **NATIONAL BODY**

Office bearers are: Shiralee Judge (SA) - Chairperson; Ann Jones (WA) – Secretary; and Barbara Gray (Qld.) – Treasurer. Regular contact is maintained with all HD Associations in Australia through exchange of newsletters, emails and quarterly meetings held via teleconference. Topics discussed include: Younger Persons in

Residential Aged Care Initiative, HD Awareness Day, and exchange of information at a State level.

In September 2008, the South Australian Association hosted the Australian Huntington's Disease National Conference and National Meeting. Attendance at the Conference was approximately 150 people with good representation from Queensland. Keynote speakers were Dr David Crauford from Manchester with an update on world-wide research and Jimmy Pollard from Boston speaking on caring issues.

Huntingtons Queensland is hosting the next bi-annual National Conference in Brisbane from 9<sup>th</sup> – 10<sup>th</sup> September 2010.

Gerritt Dommerholt, International Development Officer of the International Huntington Association (IHA) also distributes research information on a regular basis via email.

Australia is represented at IHA level by delegates elected by the National body.

### **PROFESSIONAL COMMITTEE**

A Professional Committee meeting was held in February 2009. Our President, Gerry Doyle, Treasurer, Cliff Farmer and Welfare staff members Julie Morrow, Christine Parfitt and Theresa Byrne met with Dr John O'Sullivan (Consultant Neurologist), Ms Iris Simpson (Huntington's Disease Coordinator, Queensland Health), Dr Michael Gattas (Consultant Geneticist), Dr Arnold Waugh (Consultant Psychiatrist), Ms Cate Barrett (Speech Pathologist), Dr Peter Noakes (Neuro Scientist), Dr Valentine Hyland (Molecular Geneticist) and Ms Julie White (Queensland Clinical Genetics Service).

The main focus of the meeting was the exchange of information on the services of the HD Association (National Conference in 2010, YPIRAC Reference Group, Research Scholarship and Welfare Service); Queensland Clinical Genetics Service; Huntington's Disease Clinic; and Neuro-Scientific Research Project.

### **HUNTINGTON'S DISEASE CENTRE, FLORENCE DANNELL HOUSE**

The Huntington's Disease Centre, Florence Dannel House provides a venue for the Association's Administration base, Welfare Service, Day Respite Program, Family Meetings, Education Forums and individual counselling and support for families affected by Huntington's Disease.

Minor maintenance is undertaken as required and all the necessary inspections and maintenance is routinely undertaken to the lift, electrical equipment and fire extinguishers.



Adequate funding of the Association is critical to its success and it is therefore important for the Association to maintain a successful relationship with its current funding bodies. It is equally important that we do not become over reliant on any one source of funding and continue to investigate additional funding opportunities.

### **Community Self Care Funding Program, Queensland Health:**

Our Service Agreement with Queensland Health is current from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2007 to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2010. The Association received \$134,116.00 funding through the Community Self Care Funding Program for the period 1/07/2008 to 30/06/2009. This was an increase of \$4498.00 on the previous year. We acknowledge and thank Queensland Health for their ongoing support of our service provision.

### **Donations and Bequests:**

Donations continue to grow steadily and were above the estimated budget figure. This is a pleasing outcome and can be attributed to the generosity of many long term donors to the Association. We received very generous support from the following people and companies:

- ❖ **Sean Egan's Bike Ride** from Perth to Melbourne raising in the vicinity of \$17,700.00 for the Queensland Association. **Kristine McGowan** (Sean's sister) was instrumental in raising the majority of these funds and was kindly supported by her workplace **Santos**.
- ❖ **Cycle Queensland's Bicycle Challenge:** This fundraiser does not complete until September 2009, however donations amounting to \$7,191.00 have come in during this financial year. **Abigroup Contractors Pty. Ltd.** covered the cost of the entrance fee in the Bicycle Challenge.

### **Community Fundraising:**

Income derived from sausage sizzles, art unions, cookie drive, HD Awareness morning teas, has remained stable. For the first time the Association held a Trivia Night in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Acacia Ridge. This was a good fundraiser and one we hope to repeat next year.

The sale of Cadbury Chocolates in the Workplace has proven to be an ongoing and worthwhile source of income. Our thanks to **Wendy Edwards** and **Jan Szlapak** for their time and effort in supervising and promoting this fundraiser.

We acknowledge support from **Bunnings-Maroochydore** and **Bunnings-Rocklea** for the opportunity to hold sausage sizzles.

**Community Groups:**

We continue to receive wonderful support from various community groups providing financial assistance, awareness and friendship. Major funding was received from the following groups:

- ❖ **Rotary Club of Acacia Ridge** supporting the funding of a Speech Pathologist at the Huntington’s Disease Clinic, Royal Brisbane and Women’s Hospital; assistance with promoting and running a Trivia Night; and in addition other funds were donated to assist with service provision.
